AUGUST 5 AHA president David Niose on *Nonbeliever Nation* and current humanist issues

Adapted from his book, Nonbeliever Nation: "Today's culture wars are more heated than ever. Education, public policy, and the separation between church and state have become a battlefield, and many are frustrated with the success the Religious Right has had in shaping the national agenda, from putting the brakes on gay marriage in California to stripping textbooks in Texas of references to Thomas Jefferson. But today, a growing nonreligious minority, nearly 20 percent of Americans, are finally organizing and taking explicit political positions. In Nonbeliever Nation, Niose argues that America was never in fact a Christian nation and shows how the Religious Right successfully took control of the social and political narrative. He takes us across the country to meet the secular groups now forming in opposition to that force-from humanist gatherings to the rise of the New Atheists to the explosion of secular groups on college and even high school campuses. Bill says about his hiking, "Some people wonder what I'm doing, hiking at age 80. As a boy I had Perthe's disease, which led to a half year's full bed rest and 3 1/2 years in a full length leg brace. So no hiking before I came to Palo Alto in 1960. A book, *Going Light with Backpack or Burro* by the Sierra Club, started me on weekend back pack and "Peak Bagging" trips. I learned to ski at the Club's Clair Tappaan lodge and started back country weekend ski trips. I became recognized as a leader for many such trips.

"In the 1970s I started bicycling to work to Lockheed. I did this for 9 years until a bike crash fractured my right hip, cutting off blood circulation to my hip joint, causing it to soften

Our Humanist Hike will be a visit to Portola Valley's Windy Hill, which is aptly named, so bring jackets and kites. We'll traverse the Windy Hill Picnic trail, and stay high on the grassy Anniversary and the Anniversary and Lost trails. Total distance, about 3.5 miles round trip, with great views. This area has one of the Santa Cruz Mountain's greatest viewsheds, a complete cross section of the range from the Peninsula, the Bay, its cities to the east, and the Ocean to the west. The rest of the preserve swoops down some 1300 feet to Portola Valley.
