February 5: Secular Leaders Summit - Nonbelievers Unite!

Debbie Allen, the Executive Director of the Humanist Community in Silicon Valley, will discuss her recent attendance at the annual Secular Leaders Summit. This year's Summit included representatives from 28 organizations, and was hosted by the Center For Inquiry.

Secular Leaders Summit meetings, which include two leaders from each organization, are an opportunity to overcome differences, make allies, and bring together the key decision makers.

From innovative start-ups to the few groups with multi-million dollar budgets, it's clear that the humanist/atheist/skeptic movement is coming into its own, even if they are still dwarfed by the wealth and power of ultra-conservative opponents.

Debbie Allen is a board member with several organizations including the American Humanist Association, the Humanist Society, the Reason Rally Coalition, Inc., and the Freethought Equality Fund PAC.

HUMANIST HOUSE NEWS

I just returned from a stimulating encounter at Santa Clara University, where I, along with a Lutheran Reverend and a progressive Christian Pastor, spoke with students in a course called, "Ways of Understanding Religion". Their professor, Dr. Elizabeth Drescher, requires fieldwork in local religious communities across diverse traditions of belief and practice, and this quarter they will study Christianity, Buddhism, and Atheism. A dozen undergraduates will be visiting Humanist House later this semester, and will be interested in talking to us after our forum. Although a bit shy about asking questions, they are curious about how we came to *not* believe, and how we incorporate humanism in our daily lives.

For many Humanist Community members, questions about god and the purpose of life were addressed a long, long time ago. But young adults are asking them now. More than ever they need the guidance and support of the secular humanist community to counter the dogmatic religious voices that surround us, and that have grown in strength since the election.

Humanist chapters are important. They provide social support for members and visitors. They help educate the public about the humanist alternative to religious philosophies — which sometimes impede progress and cause real harm. They encourage members to more effectively and joyfully put humanist philosophy into practice. And, more importantly than ever, humanist chapters can work with other organizations in areas where we have common concerns. The more we work with others, the better chance we have of introducing reason and compassion into decision making and problem solving efforts.

In order to accomplish our goals and promote humanist values, we need to engage in active outreach to humanists and other nontheists who are hungering for community. We must expand our social and educational opportunities to attract more of them to Humanist House. And, perhaps most importantly, we need to start putting our philosophy into action by participating in social action and social justice activities.

Our incoming board members and our committee chairs are already thinking of ways to energize our community and attract new members. Thinking is never enough, however, so we are rolling up our sleeves and getting busy! We need your help discovering where we can publish event announcements (print and online publications), and where we might table (festivals, street fairs, conferences, etc.), to spread the word that we are here! And, if you are doing something fun, like trying a new restaurant or taking a hike, consider posting the event on our Meetup website, so we can reach out to those looking to find friends in the secular community.


